LEAD EXPOSURE IS HARMFUL TO YOUR CHILD'S HEALTH

There may be an increased risk of lead poisoning if your child:

- ◆ lives in or visits a home built before 1978
- ◆ lives with an adult whose job or hobby involves lead
- ◆ has a sibling or playmate with lead poisoning
- ◆ has a caregiver who uses home remedies that may contain lead
- ◆ is included in a special population group such as foreign adoptee, refugee, migrant, immigrant, or foster child
